## **International Volunteer Day Garden Party**

## Address by the Honourable Kim Beazley AC Governor of Western Australia

## Thursday, 5th December 2019

I would firstly like to acknowledge the traditional owners of the land on which we meet – the Whadjuk Noongar people – and pay my respects to their elders past and present.

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the beautiful gardens of Government House, my home. As the Governor and Patron of Volunteering WA, I am delighted to join you this afternoon as we celebrate International Volunteer Day.

International Volunteer Day, established by the United Nations General Assembly in 1985, is an opportunity "for volunteers and volunteer involving organisations to celebrate their efforts, to share their values, and to promote their work among their communities, non-governmental organisations (NGOs), United Nationals agencies, government authorities and the private sector."

International Volunteer Day also serves as an occasion for communities to acknowledge, celebrate and express their appreciation for the invaluable work of volunteers.

This is the second time I have had the pleasure of attending this event.
